At the Neighborhood Council's November meeting, we were grateful to receive presentations and updates from Columbia Code Enforcement about long- and short-term rentals and other code matters, from Columbia Water about Shandon water infrastructure projects, and from Gills Creek Watershed Association about steps residents can take to help manage stormwater drainage.

It was also announced that Shandon has been awarded a \$1,200 Love Your Block grant from the City of Columbia for beautification and gardening activities at Emily Douglas and Sims Parks, including establishing garden beds as needed; acquiring soil, plants, and other greenery; and organizing neighborhood planting days. ZONING UPDATES: JUDY ANDERSON

Ian O'Connor, Code Enforcement Officer for the Division of Rentals, spoke at the SNC in November and discussed both short- and long-term rentals. Also present was our new neighborhood officer for Shandon, Shawn McNicoll. The top ten Code Enforcement Residential concerns are as follows: Overgrown lots, Roll carts, Outdoor placement (of items), Peeling paint, Abandonment of cars to include license plates, Front yard parking, Home in extreme disrepair, Premise identification, Residential rental ordinance, and right of ways (maintenance). Further information is available at Code Enforcement Division - City of Columbia Police Department. Both officers emphasized the need for communication and requested that pictures concerning any inquiry would be most helpful; this is one way the neighborhood can assist them in doing their jobs.
